Respect Wildlife

NOTE: Guidelines listed here are just highlights of more detailed information available from Outdoor Skills & Ethics Booklets

- Feed Yourself, not Wildlife. Feeding wildlife damages their health, alters natural behaviors, and exposes them to predators and other dangers.
 - Observe Wildlife from a Distance. Do not follow or approach them.
 - Consider the basic needs of Wildlife. Allow Wildlife access to water sources. Avoid them during sensitive times: mating, raising young, or winter. Control pets at all times, or leave them home!
 - Prevent unnecessary pollution. Washing and human waste disposal must be done carefully so the environment is not polluted, and animals and aquatic life are not injured.
