Be considerate of Other Visitors

NOTE: Guidelines listed here are just highlights of more detailed information available from Outdoor Skills & Ethics Booklets



- Maximize the sense of Solitude. Visit the backcountry in small groups. To maximize your feeling of privacy, avoid trips on holidays and busy weekends. Enjoy nature's sounds and keep the noise level down while traveling.
- Be courteous. Yield to other users on the trail. Groups leading or riding livestock have the right-of-way, so move off the trail to the downhill side.
- Practice good pet etiquette. Keep pets under control at all times or leave them home. Bury dog feces in a cathole away from camps and trails or pack-it-out.
- Preserve our Cultural Heritage. Enjoy and learn from historical and archaeological sites but respect these treasures. Leave what you find, where you found it.
- Camp with style. When selecting a campsite, choose a site where rocks or trees will screen it from other's view. Keep noise down in camp so as not to disturb other campers or those passing by on the trail.
